The family of my grandfather on my mother's side came from Sweden and homesteaded in Jewell County, Kansas. My father was raised in Nebraska where his father had a grocery store. My father wanted to be a veterinarian, and since Nebraska did not have a veterinary school, he attended Kansas State University. In fact, my mother's father, my mother, and my father are all Kansas State graduates. I was raised in Atwater, Minnesota, where my father was a large-animal veterinarian. When it came time to go to college there wasn't any doubt that I would attend Kansas State. I graduated from Kansas State with a BS in Physics in 1958, and received a PhD in Physics from Duke University in 1961. I served two years of active Duty in the United States Army because I had taken advanced ROTC while at Kansas State.

In 1965 I found myself back at Kansas State on the faculty. Bubbly and energetic eight-year old Aleena has been enlightening supervisors, clinicians, and staff at the Herndon Clinic for the last four years. Her witty personality has brought smiles to everyone's faces since the day she was referred by Hays Area Children's Center and evaluated in 2009 for a speech and language delay, while also showing signs of having Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). With a diagnosis of ASD and a referral to receive extra assistance with her communication skills in 2011, Aleena began therapy at the Herndon Clinic.

Aleena has been and is currently working on her communicative function skills of turn-taking, following the rules of a game, and answering 'wh' questions in therapy with her two graduate clinicians Paige Gurciullo and Abigail Rohr. Aleena is currently being seen at the Herndon Clinic for 45 minutes twice each week. She uses a social narrative and visual schedule to see the order of activities that will be completed during her therapy sessions each day. While working with Aleena, second year graduate student Paige mentioned how "my client has been great to work with. Aleena has challenged me to think differently with therapy and she always keeps me on my toes!"

Aleena's mother had a few suggestions to give to other parents/caregivers whose children are currently being seen at the Herndon Clinic. She spoke about "keeping an open mind and that this a learning opportunity for students to further their knowledge in order to become future speechlanguage pathologists. Graduate student Abigail spoke about how "Aleena is a hard worker and watching her grow in each session makes me feel accomplished as a first year graduate student. Also, Aleena always has something funny to say, which will make you giggle!" Aleena's mother also noted

how "every child is going to react differently to all of the different techniques" and that parents should not become negative if a technique does not work and to allow the clinicians to try a variety of strategies.

When asked about how Aleena has benefited from the Herndon Clinic, Aleena's mother reported that this clinic is great because even though there are different clinicians each semester, each person is working on the same thing to help Aleena. She also noted how each new clinician uses a different technique or approach to the therapy sessions and Aleena is able to obtain a variety of social skills that could be used anywhere Aleena and her family go. Aleena's mother also wanted to say that the Scottish Rite Foundation has "been a huge help" and a "win win" for not only Aleena, but for the clinicians at the Herndon Clinic. Her daughter has been able to be seen at an affordable price with a flexible schedule, while the clinicians have been able to have hands on experiences, with much thanks to the Scottish Rite Foundation.
